By winning the finals, the Chuo squad came into the first grade after three year's interval and at the same time the Gakushuin team dropped unfortunately into the second grade.

Following Chuo's sweeping victory 5-2 in the first game with the Gakushuin nine June 6, the second game was played at the same Stadium before a crowd of 4.000.



### On Presidential Election

It was reported that in accordance with the new basic regulation, a Presidential election is slated to take place on August 5 this year, and then the newly elected President will assume school management. Those who are concerned have shown a keen interest in this serious issue, particularly SSGA (Student Self-Government Association) which is watching the election with critical eyes.

Highly reliable sources on the campus said in an exclusive interview with the Herald that some persons had already been picked up as possible candidates.

Some circles on the campus, however, expressed fears that deep-rooted factional strifes inside school authorities might come up on the surface on this occasion.

We strongly hope that these fears would not take actual shape.

When we look back on some elections in the past, like in many cases in the general elections in Japan, the nomination of President of Chuo University, was actually maneuvered behind the scenes, although it is said that the Board of Directors are to name President from among the persons chosen by a screening committee for the Presidential election.

Such being the case, professors have almost had no voice on the serious campus matter

Under such circumstances practically all students, except for some concerned, may be little concerned about the election on August 5. This might be called a tragic aspect of students in Japan who carries on her back the so-called "burden of over-population." That is to say, most students are too busy to show their interest in the

But as long as the Fundamental Regulation regulates how to deal with the school management and stipulates that the President holds the biggest power in excuting the Regulation, it would be a duty on the part of students to show their due interest in the election.

As seen in many countries, elections are regarded as part of democracy. For this reason, the coming election should be closely watched in the hope that it would be a clean one.

What is required of a President is that he must be one who excells in leadership and is endowed with ability, to deal with hard problems on and off the campus, listening with broad mind to the voice of students and pro-

In a recent interview with the Hakumon Herald, Vice-President Kinsho Katayama pointed out one of the requirements of a President and stressed that he must be a person who fully understands what is true education and knows how to maintain peace on the campus.

We students are in no way inclined to have the coming new President carry out all of our requests as such is impossible, but we believe it would not be difficult for school authorities to lend their ears to the appeals of a great many professors and students and adopt them as much as possible into the policy of the school manage-

In conclusion, we strongly hope again that the forthcoming Presidential election will be carried out on the basis of the democratic principle and that a new Presiwill be a person capable of bringing great prosperity to Chuo University.

A peace corps report on conditions in at least one African country, warns of "very real problems" that the corps will face in its efforts to aid Africa

The report, which deals with Senegal, was prepared by William Moyers, an associate director of the corps, who went to Africa with Vice-President Lyn don Johnson.

"The basic difficulty," Moyers reported," will be maintaining the health of the Peace Corps volunteers.

"Flies, mosquitos, filthall add up to a major obstacle to success. It will be essential to provide a public health person and a medical assistant to of our teams."

The Moyers report stresses the difficulties to be encountered by corps volunteers in Africa. It states that though this report only with Senegal, conditions it describes are typical of much of Africa, Asia and Latin America.


